An Introduction to

Kodo Arts Sphere America

(KASA) by Daniel Rosen

In ancient Japan, the taiko (the traditional Japanese drum) was a symbol of community, used not only to keep a backbeat for local festivals and ceremonies, but also as a basic means of communication. It could be

used to call a meeting, to warn of danger, or to gather people in times of celebration.

The Japanese taiko has taken on a life of its own in North America, and its role as a centerpiece for many communities continues. Since the early seventies, Japanese Americans and Japanese-Canadians have been using the taiko as a voice for their community and an expression of their cultural identity.

Today North America is enjoying a veritable 'taiko boom', with thousands of players spanning all age groups and ethnic backgrounds involved in the taiko experience. There are estimated to be over

one-hundred and fifty community-based taiko groups in North America, and that number is growing.

In today's fast-paced world of computers and the information super highway, it is easy to forget our past, and to concentrate on electronic connections rather than interpersonal ones.

Enter *Kodo Arts Sphere America* (KASA), a United States nonprofit organization established to encourage, enable and support programs and opportunities for North Americans to study and understand the traditional and contemporary Japanese music of the taiko and its related performing arts.

KASA believes that the power of the taiko, and of the arts in general, is a power to unite people regardless of age, race or cultural background. The beat of the taiko is a common language; a primal form of expression that can link all human beings.

Kodo Arts Sphere America is the brainchild of *Toshio Kawauchi*, the founding managing director of Kodo. Known to his friends as 'Hancho', Mr.

Kawauchi hoped that Kodo could some day help promote cultural exchanges between Japan and North America. He envisioned an American-based company which could work towards that goal. In March of 2002 this dream became a reality when KASA was officially recognized as a nonprofit organization in the state of California.

Though Hancho died long before KASA's realization, his dream lives on in the spirit of KASA, a grass-roots organization whose board members are

also members of the taiko community. The directors of KASA envision the organization as a haven for taiko practitioners and audiences in both America and Japan. We hope that KASA will serve as a communication hub among taiko groups regardless of country, and to provide opportunities for people not just to play taiko, but to revisit its origins and discuss its significance to the community. We believe that one of the key ways to achieve these goals is through the support of hands-on local workshops. Today, the roots of taiko and its spirit are often overlooked as new players rush onto the performance stage with no knowledge of its history. KASA hopes to bridge this gap by creating opportunities for North American players to work with instructors both from Japan and North America who teach an awareness of its traditions as well as technique.

Although the KASA staff has been hard at work with various projects over the past two years, our first official project since incorporation will be the KASA 2002 Summer Workshop Tour with Kodo's principal vocalist *Yoko Fujimoto*, and principal dancer *Chieko Kojima*. The tour will cover seven cities in the United States over seven weeks, with stops in *Boston*, *Minneapolis*, *Portland*, *Seattle*, *Emeryville*, *Sacramento* and *Moab*, *Utah*. This kind of tour provides a rare occasion for Kodo members to step down from the stage and engage in a more direct exchange with participants; this is the real mission of KASA, to create a new space for people of different cultures and backgrounds to get to know each other, and share ideas in a hands-on environment.

Workshops are nothing new for Kodo members, who have been invited to the United States and Canada many times in the past, both to teach and to perform with local taiko groups, as well as to take part in gatherings such as the biennial North America Taiko Conference. With the formation of KASA, these opportunities will become less of a rarity and more of a rule. With increased public and private support, KASA intends to sponsor workshops and residencies with other Japanese artists of various disciplines, as well as to provide North American artists with similar opportunities in Japan. KASA will serve as a nonprofit umbrella organization which can facilitate communication among community taiko groups, both in Japan and North America. KASA is open to, and will strive to be accessible to all groups who share our enthusiasm for the taiko and appreciate its inherent

power to positively shape the world in which we live. With your help, KASA can provide the guidance and support needed to understand and perpetuate the taiko tradition and all of its related art forms.
