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A Filetta's Sado Impressions

Kodo talked to Jean-Claude Acquaviva, leader of this year's EC main guests, the Corsican vocal group A Filetta. This is a distillation of that conversation.

Our impressions of Japan and Sado Island are one and the same because we came here straight from the airport and have yet to go anywhere else. And these impressions are very important because we have been invited here like brothers.

First, it is very hot! That aside, we hope that for the rest of our time in Japan we can stay in places that are as welcoming, where we can breathe, where there is no pollution, where it is green, natural and wild.

We are very impressed with Kodo, to see the precision with which they perform. Everything is very detailed, and extraordinarily disciplined, yet it is extremely artistic and musical. Working with them was

very compatible. It is no easy thing to combine serious and rigorous work with high musical and artistic quality if the music you try to collaborate with is too shaken and out of control. One can lose the emotion.

When we first thought of the collaboration it was

difficult to imagine how it would be accomplished because we are a group far away from Kodo's rhythmic rigour. We come from an ancient vocal tradition in which there is no rhythm, so when we watched Kodo's CDs and DVDs we were concerned that we would make a mess of their music, disturb everything. After the first time we got together in Paris though, we saw that we were working with musicians who were able to understand our music. When we received the proposed play list from Kodo we were reassured because

we could see that a marriage of the two kinds of music was possible, and I think the results were beautiful.

Once, during the encore when we were singing a sacred song, many in the audience began dancing. That was the first time that had happened in 32 years! And the audience was clapping in rhythm from the very first phrase, even during the breaks in singing, It was wonderful! In France and Europe, they don't clap when we are not singing. They would lose the rhythm.

Kodo members are very enthusiastic and they listen to each other with great concentration. Not just musically but in every detail they take care of everything, and they do it with warmth from beginning

to end. From the rehearsals right through to the ferry send off, everyone has their role which they carry off conscientiously and with warmth. In Corsica we try to do the same, welcoming the artists. We go to festivals all the time around the world, and there are occasions when you are not even introduced to the festival director, you just sing and leave! Here we enjoyed being welcomed and spending time together, and this is something we also aim for in our festival on Corsica.

We have collaborated with many genres of groups over the years, even rhythm-based groups like *Daniel Waro* in Reunion Island, who plays with 4 other percussionists. But there is a huge difference between the percussion on Reunion Island and Kodo. Because of

this experience I think it will make it much easier for us to work with other groups.

It is important for us to always keep in mind why our group was founded. The 20th century was very tough for Corsica because between the First and Second World Wars, a lot of strong people left the island. So many links with tradition disappeared in the period between the 50's and the 70's. Since the late 70's many groups were established who tried to breathe new life into the old traditions. So from the 70's to the 90's it was a period of trying to get back to the roots, to make them familiar to people again. Since the 90's – having recovered the traditions – we are trying to infuse new life into them and move forward using new arrangements and compositions.

Yesterday and the day before while we were waiting in the wings to go on stage and watching Kodo playing so powerfully, we were very excited and saying to each other 'Well, it will soon be our turn!' Someone remarked 'I feel like we are firemen!' 'Why? 'Because now we are going to go on stage and put out the fire!'

I want very much to come back to Sado. It was an amazing experience. But next time I think I'll come in February. I like the wet and cold!

I had heard that A Filetta felt strongly that the festival should be a place of exchange among the artists. The dining room where the artists took their lunch and dinners together was symbolic of this. A Filetta would suddenly burst into powerful song, vibrating the room and our spirits. Guests would join in a round, everyone taken up in a swirl of musical conversation. New friendships were forged with our neighbours. Cheek by jowl and happily crowded, bottle after bottle of Corsican wine tumbled away.

v e separated by vast distances. the paths our two groups have trodden overlap in many ways. Living on islands for over 20 years, through music we have both encouraged exchange among different cultures. And then we have taken what we

This will be my souvenir for future Earth Celebrations. It is my fondest hope that we will gain a deeper understanding of each others' activities and encourage each other like siblings. With many thanks to our Corsican friends, I so look forward to our next meeting. À bientôt!
